## **PSA PHOTOJOURNALISM – PHOTO STORY and SHORT STORY**

In the recent PSA Australia newsletter, Roy made mention of the closing dates for the PSA Photojournalism Division annual Photo Story and Photo Short Story competitions. These are free competitions, open to all members of PSA, that are offered once per year. More information about these competitions is found here:

These competitions are a bit different from providing a single image and hoping that there is enough story, interest, and skill evident for your image to be noticed. In a story or short story competition you provide a series of images that collectively tell a story.

It sounds easy, but there are a few things to consider when you put your 'story' together'. Think about this as portfolio, or an essay, where the images must work together and flow in order for the story to become evident. You might want to think about the following:

- Start with an opening image, one that sets the scene, this might be a wide angle view or an image that has a notice or sign that indicates a place or event.
- The images in the middle can be a variety of close up, action, location or more about the event. Some of these might not hold their place as a stand-alone image but have value as part of the collection. Make sure to include some closer up images.
- · The final image should be a 'summary' image, or one that closes the story.

The requirement for a short story is just 6 images, with just a title. No text is allowed. For the photo story the requirements are for up to 20 images, and text is allowed (up to 200 words) that can be written on a single image or can be written throughout the story.

In 2022 I was lucky enough to gain a Silver medal for the PJ Short Story competition. I had been photographing our local football team for some time, and one day came upon the Masters Women's team. These are women from 35-50's still playing competitive Australian Rules Football and loving it. The game was full of laughter, cheers from the sidelines and a lot of good sportsmanship. It was quite a unique perspective of our national game.

I now think a lot differently when I am out shooting, making sure that I take lots of additional photos of the surrounds, the people, the action, the location and more.













A while back I visited Iron Knob, a deserted mining town in South Australia. With the idea of a photo story in mind, I walked around town shooting every angle I could think of – from deserted houses, signage, trashed cars, bent fences, lonely dogs, old art painted on walls and much more. One day I'll get back to this file and see whether I have enough for a photo story, or maybe another road trip is in order! By the time you read this article, the closing date for the 2024 PJ story awards will have passed. But this now allows you to think a little differently when you are out shooting and gives you a lot of time to practice before next year's round. ### **Sky Replacements**

Here is the information sent to international judges by the Executive Director of PSA Exhibition Services, David Poey-Cher Tay, APSA, GMPSA/b, on 17th May.

The PSA Ethics Investigation Team (EIT) is reporting many violations related to replacing skies in images entered in the PID Division of exhibitions, as well as other Divisions.

As a judge, you are reminded of the PSA's authorship rules: the use of any 3<sup>rd</sup> party elements like skies, textures and brushes is prohibited. Replacing any image element in PID is only allowed if the inserted element (like a new sky or a background texture) is the original work of the author.

For greater clarity: exhibitors are NOT permitted to use skies or textures from Photoshop (or other software) in PSA exhibitions in any Division, including PID. Obviously, sky replacements, textures and brushes are not allowed at all in the reality divisions: Nature, Photojournalism, Photo Travel.

As a judge, if you suspect a sky from Photoshop (or other software) has been used, you can ask the exhibition Chair to request the original unedited file of the image. If the sky has been replaced the author also needs to send to the Chair the original unedited file of the sky that was used. Entrants are made aware that they may need to show the original unedited files when requested. If they cannot or do not send the original unedited file, the image will be disqualified.

If you are a judge and you have determined that an entrant has violated the authorship rule by replacing a sky with another sky not authored by that entrant, please follow these steps:

- Please disqualify the image.
- Provide the chairman with the following information that should be added to the entrant's Report Card "The image has had elements added (sky) that the entrant is not the author of".
- Please ask the Chairman to forward the jpeg as entered, the name of the entrant, their email address and their country of origin to the PSA EIT Secretary at eit-secretary@psa-photo.org (this is for the PSAs records only, so we can keep a track of when the entrant was notified).

Our aim, as always, is to provide a fair playing field for all entrants and while I respect that this request will add to your workload, I am asking for your assistance.



For quite a few years I have been a great fan of the Photoshop panels produced by



Tony Kuper. His latest *free* offering is the "TK Selection Brush Panel".

Once installed in Photoshop, this panel provides a very convenient way of making selections with a brush. The selections can be freeform or they can utilise the PS Rectangular Object

Selection or Lasso Object Selection functions.
